

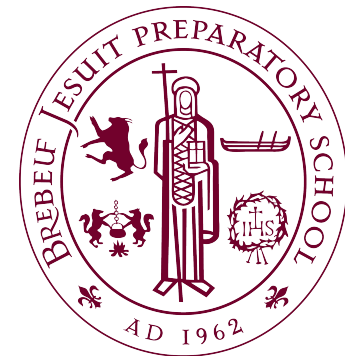

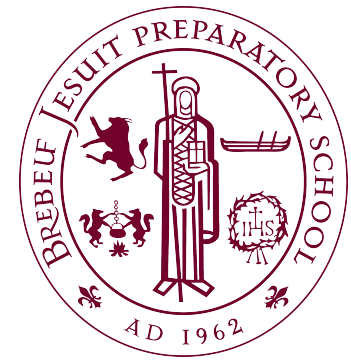
# Community Service Program

## Freshman Service Days

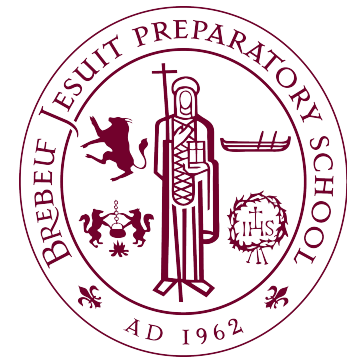
Opportunities to serve at local food pantries, shelters and other social service agencies are made available throughout the year.

## Advocacy Days

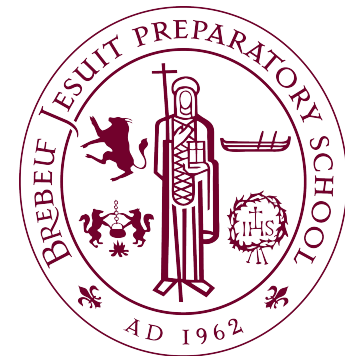
Days organized so that students can meet with elected officials to advocate policy changes on behalf of those marginalized in society.

## Mentors Program

# Service and Immersion Trip Opportunities



**El Salvador** – An immersion trip for our students to experience the food, culture, people and history of El Salvador. There is a special focus placed on the lives of Oscar Romero and the Jesuit Martyrs.

**Domestic Spring Break Service Trips** – A unique experience for students who want to spend their Spring Break volunteering with populations in need. Past trip locations have included Chicago, Detroit, New Orleans, and West Virginia.

**Pine Ridge Reservation** – A week-long exchange where students learn about the culture of the Oglala Lakota Sioux affected by the impoverished conditions on a reservation.
